

United Way of the Mid-South serves Shelby, Fayette, Lauderdale and Tipton counties in Tennessee; DeSoto, Tate and Tunica counties in Mississippi and Crittenden County Arkansas

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United Way of the Mid-South is helping individuals and families across the region move out of poverty and build a brighter future for themselves and their children. United Way aligns the work of 229 community partners across our eight-county service region with programs in child care, youth development, affordable housing, job training, healthcare, victim assistance and more.

In 2023/24, United Way touched the lives t Hill of Mid-Southerners **422,371** times through grantmaking to local agencies, Driving The Dream[™], Free Tax Prep, community training, Lewisburg partnerships, and volunteer services.

COLLECTIVE EFFORT CREATES SIGNIFICANT IMPACT

Driving The Dream[™] (DTD[™]) is committed to breaking the cycle of generational poverty by connecting people with a network of services to meet their immediate needs and build their long-term financial and social mobility.

In May 2023, United Way of the Mid-South was awarded an ^{\$}18.2 million Families First Community Grant from the Tennessee Department of Human Services. This extraordinary investment sets Driving The Dream on a trajectory to impact over 5600 more families (14,000 adults and children) in two years, and positions United Way of the Mid-South as the lead innovator in collaborative large-scale human service delivery systems.

Working through a network of nearly 200 human service agencies, hospitals, schools, and faithbased organizations, Driving The Dream connects people with a network of services to help them move toward the life of which they dream. Our partners are advancing individuals and families with support for housing, job training, quality childcare, youth development, health, transportation, and financial management.



The good work being done in these domains that affect poverty is multiplied through the collective impact approach provided by DTD.

With a shared data platform, Driving The Dream participants may consent to enter our system of care where they can be seamlessly referred to and helped by other agencies in the DTD network. Their successes, setbacks, and additional needs are consistently observed so that support is offered to keep them on track to achieve their goals. A shared care model ensures that all participants, no matter which agency they are served by, receive equitable access to care, and each participant is treated with dignity and respect. The Driving The Dream network is easy to access through the DTD Call Center, an online referral form, a community kiosk, or at a participating partner agency.



BENEFIT KITCHEN

United Way provides **Benefit Kitchen**, a new and innovative text service, to connect Tennessee residents with the government benefits they qualify for. Through a series of short questions sent via confidential text messages, Benefit Kitchen pre-qualifies individuals for services, such as SNAP, child care assistance, tax credits, high speed internet, and more. In 2023/24 1304 household members used the Benefit Kitchen service.

FREE TAX-PREP the key to possibilities

FREE TAX PREP

Supporting financial stability with free service and education.

In partnership with the IRS, United Way of the Mid-South provides trained volunteers at sites across the region to complete federal and state tax returns with no fees. For over twenty years **Free Tax Prep** has helped low and moderate income households move toward financial stability by maximizing their refunds, taking full advantage of the Earned Income Tax Credit, and saving families the high cost of tax filing fees. The Earned Income Tax Credit is the federal government's most significant poverty-fighting program, boosting the income for low-wage workers and off-setting federal income tax.

2023-24 Free Tax Prep Impact

The individuals and families served by Free Tax Prep are often the most at-risk of predatory filing services. United Way's clients have an average adjusted gross income of ^{\$}29,784. With the help of Free Tax Prep trained preparers, clients received an average Earned Income Tax Credit of ^{\$}1,993 and an average refund of ^{\$}1,641. A refund of 5.5% of household income greatly impacts the financial health of people who need help the most. Free Tax Prep sites available to all Mid-Southerners

COMMUNITY IMPACT

Equitable funding for communities in 8 Mid-South counties.

The **Community Impact Fund** at United Way of the Mid-South supports 59 agencies with grant funding. Of the 224,425 people served through programs funded by Community Impact grants, 85% are from low-to-moderate income households. The pillars of support in financial security, healthy communities, youth opportunity, and community resilience provide the framework for our grant-making and community programs.

Sixteen Equity Fund grantees, providing grassroots efforts, received funding to address the root causes of racial disparities in our city's most vulnerable neighborhoods.

United Way of the Mid-South administers Federal Emergency Food and Shelter Grants for Shelby County and Crittenden County on behalf of the Federal Emergency Management Agency. The allocated grants provide food, emergency shelter, utility assistance and assistance paying mortgages/rent. This funding is not designated for disaster relief, but rather to assist families facing unexpected crises. In 2023/24, United Way administered ^{\$}438,567 in funding for 19 agencies.

FINANCIAL SECURITY

United Way of the Mid-South leads and funds a variety of services that increase income security and improve financial management, transforming the lives of individuals and families. When families thrive, communities thrive.

To ease the cost burden of health care, UWMS distributes SingleCare prescription drug cards. 23,311 Memphis Metro residents used SingleCare cards saving a total of \$2,113,628 on prescription medications.

Healthy living is negatively impacted by poverty, leading to chronic illness and lower life expectancy. Poor health limits a person's ability to retain employment, and poverty limits access to preventative health care. Improvements in health translate into improved economic mobility. United Way of the Mid-South invests in early childhood services to ensure that children receive a foundation for life success. Continued support throughout childhood encourages academic success and a healthy, bright future in adulthood.

Early Intervention

COMMUNITY RESILIENCE

United Way of the Mid-South builds community resilience by funding services that help stabilize families in crisis and by increasing access to human services.

Addressing the Digital Divide

United Way of the Mid-South supported the expansion of a computer lab at the YWCA Domestic Violence Shelter.



Emergency Services

Mid-Southerners received help when facing emergency situations through United Way agencies and the Emergency Food and Shelter Program administered by UWMS.

- **131,214** people received food through food pantries, gift cards, home delivered meals and congregate meals
- 16,801 people received clothing
- **4,755** people received emergency shelter services
- **1.010** households received help with rent or mortgages
 - 749 people received free legal services that increased safety, housing and/or financial stability

Fire protection was provided to 5,900 residents of Tate County. Volunteers reported to 166 fire and medical calls.

STUFF THE BUS

Stuff the Bus school supply collection drive was held in partnership with Memphis Shelby County Schools (MSCS) with support from United Way's corporate supporters. Collection boxes were available at partner locations throughout the month of July. Volunteers and staff from United Way and MSCS counted and tallied the supplies that were provided to students and teachers across the district. United Way collected nearly **30,000** individual items valued at over ^{\$}**230,000**.

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Days of Caring was held across multiple locations in April to launch Volunteer Month. We welcomed 147 volunteers who participated in five service opportunities and contributed over **\$10,000** in volunteer effort value. A collection drive for the YWCA's domestic violence shelter resulted in a donation of 860 items valued at over **\$3,500**.



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COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT



Trunk or Treat is United Way of the Mid-South's largest single event that drew over **3200** people in 2023/24. The event held at United Way Plaza provides families with a safe and free festival. Children, dressed in costume, visited decorated trunks and enjoyed face painting, a game truck, rock climbing, photos with characters and more! Services were available, such as vaccinations, Amazon employment recruitment, My City Rides, and a free hot lunch was provided to all attendees.
